



# Art-Sticky Learning

<p><b>Expressive Art and Design</b>          The development of children's artistic and cultural awareness supports their imagination and creativity. It is important that children have regular opportunities to engage with the arts, enabling them to explore and play with a wide range of media and materials. The quality and variety of what children see, hear and participate in is crucial for developing their understanding, self-expression, vocabulary and ability to communicate through the arts. The frequency, repetition and depth of their experiences are fundamental to their progress in interpreting and appreciating what they hear, respond to and observe.</p> <p><b>Physical Development</b>          Fine motor control and precision helps with hand-eye co-ordination which is later linked to early literacy. Repeated and varied opportunities to explore and play with small world activities, puzzles, arts and crafts and the practice of using small tools, with feedback and support from adults, allow children to develop proficiency, control and confidence.</p>

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Draw with increasing complexity and detail, such as representing a face with a circle and including details.</li> <li>• Use drawing to represent ideas like movement or loud noises.</li> <li>• Explore colour and colour mixing.</li> <li>• Show different emotions in their drawings – happiness, sadness, fear etc</li> </ul>		
<b>Physical Development</b>		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Use large-muscle movements to wave flags and streamers, paint and make marks.</li> <li>• Choose the right resources to carry out their own plan.</li> <li>• Use one-handed tools and equipment, for example, making snips in paper with scissors.</li> <li>• Use a comfortable grip with good control when holding pens and pencils</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Develop their small motor skills so that they can use a range of tools competently, safely and confidently.</li> </ul>	<b>Fine Motor Skills</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing - using the tripod grip in almost all cases.</li> <li>• Use a range of small tools, including scissors, paintbrushes and cutlery.</li> <li>• Begin to show accuracy and care when drawing</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A self-portrait is a representation of oneself created by the artist.</li> <li>• There are different kinds of sketching pencils.</li> <li>• Our face is made of features such as eyes, mouth, nose.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Northern Lights are a natural light display in the sky, predominantly seen in the Arctic and Antarctic regions.</li> <li>• Artists can experiment with different chalk pastel techniques.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A print is a picture made by pressing an inked design onto paper.</li> <li>• A print is created by pressing your design onto a soft surface like foam or rubber.</li> <li>• Understand that there are different printmaking techniques.</li> </ul>
